Phonics

- Children in Year 1 throughout the country will all be taking part in a phonics screening check during the same week in June.
- It is a way for teachers to check how the children are progressing with their phonic learning.
- Good progress in phonics means the children are on track to become fluent readers who can enjoy reading for pleasure and for learning.







RE

In RE we will be exploring the question: What does it mean to belong to a faith community?

We will think about how we all belong to something and how belonging is an important part of our lives,

We will look at signs of belonging in the Christian, Muslim and Jewish faiths.



Homework:

In addition to the homework mat, children should ideally also:

- Read for 10 minutes every night. For the majority of children throughout Y1, the focus of these reading sessions should be fluency (applying phonics to segment and blend words).
- Listen to stories as much as possible. The focus of these sessions should be to develop a love of reading and to enhance the children's understanding of vocabulary. The children will visit the KS1 library every week.
- Use Numbots regularly to develop a secure sense of number.



Communication :

Parents/Carers can speak with staff:

- At the beginning or end of the day.
- Via Dojo; please speak with me if you need help with Dojo. Messages sent to staff after 5:30 PM may not be responded to until the next school day.

-Homework and newsletters will be uploaded onto the school website and onto Dojo.

Reports/Parents' evening:

Two reports will be provided throughout the year, to provide you with updates regarding your child's progress. A midyear report will be sent out in February, and an end of year report will be sent out in July.

Two parents' evenings will happen throughout the year. Information regarding these will be provided via Dojo and Parentmail nearer the time.



Uniform:

During the school day:

- BLACK trousers, skirt or pinafore dress
- JADE GREEN polo shirt
- CHARCOAL GREY cardigan or jumper (knitwear only; no sweatshirts)
- BLACK OR GREY socks or tights
- BLACK shoes
- GREEN check dresses may be worn in summer

For P.E.

WHITE - round neck t-shirt (no branded sportswear please)

- BLACK shorts or leggings or joggers.
- BLACK OR WHITE trainers.
- Socks if tights are worn to school
- School jumpers.

Please ensure ALL items of clothing and belongings have your child's name in them; we had so many incidents with

cardigans and jumpers last year - please put names in them.

Dear Parents / Carers,

This letter contains information regarding the implementation of changes regarding PE kit and our expectations for the coming school year.

What are the changes?

During the pandemic we have asked pupils to attend school wearing their kit rather than their full uniform on the days that they do PE. Although this was initially implemented to reduce the number of items being brought into school we have recognised additional benefits for the pupils and the school.

Therefore, moving forward pupils will be expected to attend school wearing their PE kit on the days they do PE or sport clubs.

What are the benefits?

- Saving the time spent changing into / and out of PE kits means the time the pupils spend on physical activity is maximised
- Reduces the possibility of clothing / shoes etc being lost or misplaced in school
- Reduces wear and tear on uniform and maximises the usage of PE kits
- PE bags will no longer be required and cloakrooms can be more effectively utilised

What should my child be wearing for school on their PE day?

To ensure pupils look smart during the school day as well as being ready for their PE lesson we will be implementing some changes to our uniform policy to include a 'PE day' dress code as follows:

- Plain white t-shirt <u>NO</u> logos or prints (t-shirts with the official Holden Clough logo are acceptable but not necessary)
- Plain black shorts, joggers or leggings NO branded sportswear
- Grey school jumper, cardigan or fleece NO logos or branding clothing (items bearing the
 official Holden Clough logo are acceptable but not necessary)
- Black trainers

Students should not be wearing **football shirts**, **branded sportswear or other** items of PE clothing not listed in the dress code. For safety reasons pupils should not wear jewellery or earrings and long hair should be tied back.

On colder or wetter days pupils can bring an addition jacket or top to wear over their PE kit but these must not be worn around school

We would like to thank parents for their ongoing support and cooperation.

Birthdays

- School policy requests children no longer bring in sweets or cake to celebrate their birthday due to us being a healthy school.
- Instead we are wanting to improve our class library therefore you can donate a book and we will read the book to the class.
- It will stay in that class library so children can enjoy reading it.
- We will still sing happy birthday to celebrate and children can still wear their own clothes on that day.

Other information:

- All children in Early years and KS1 are entitled to a free school meal. Please contact the office for more information regarding school lunches.
- Packed lunches should be as healthy as possible -
- Children in KS1 receive a free stack every day.
- Please send in water bottles for the children to use. These should ideally be taken home each day to be washed. These should contain **water only** and not juice. We are working towards becoming a healthy school.
- The children should not bring their own stationary/pencil cases into school. Different teachers have different rules around this, but the Years 1-3 phase do not allow pencil cases as they are not necessary and can often cause problems within the classroom (losing items etc.). Likewise, the children do not need to bring large rucksacks to school; the cloakrooms are quite small and large bags are usually not needed. No toys in school.
- All medication needs to be handed in to the office teachers/teaching assistants cannot take any medication from you.
